Our system identity



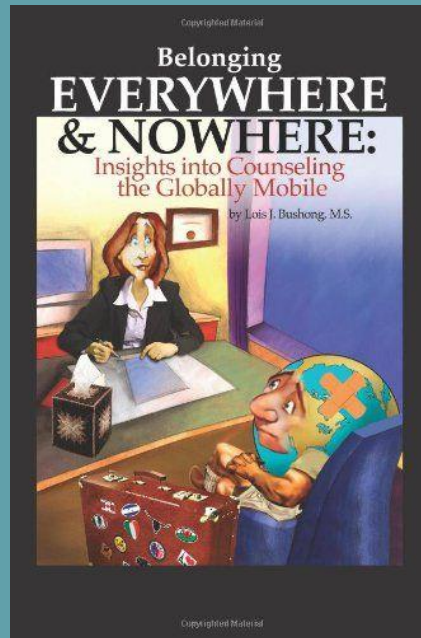
Ours is growing up in a 'God system'

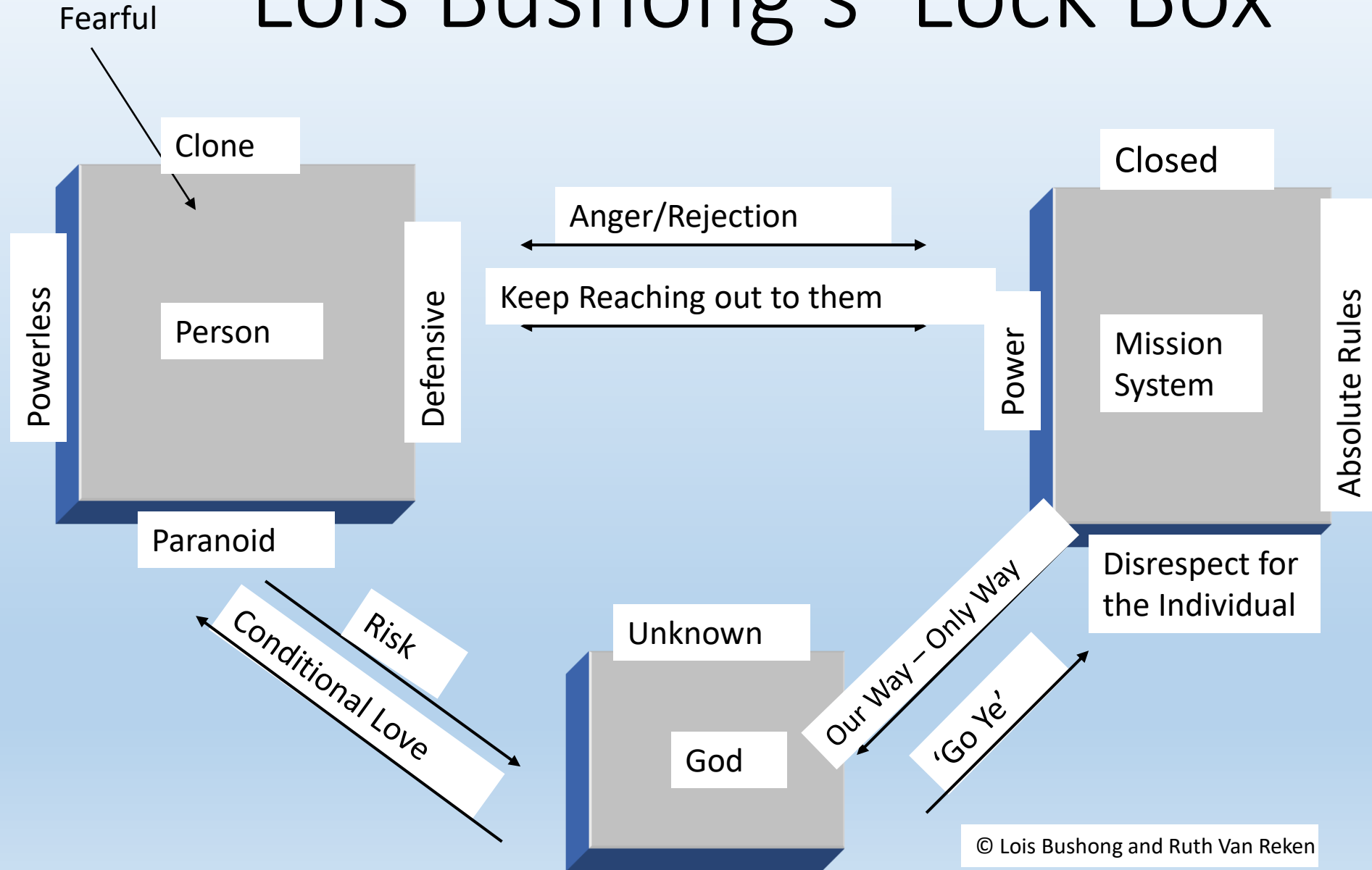

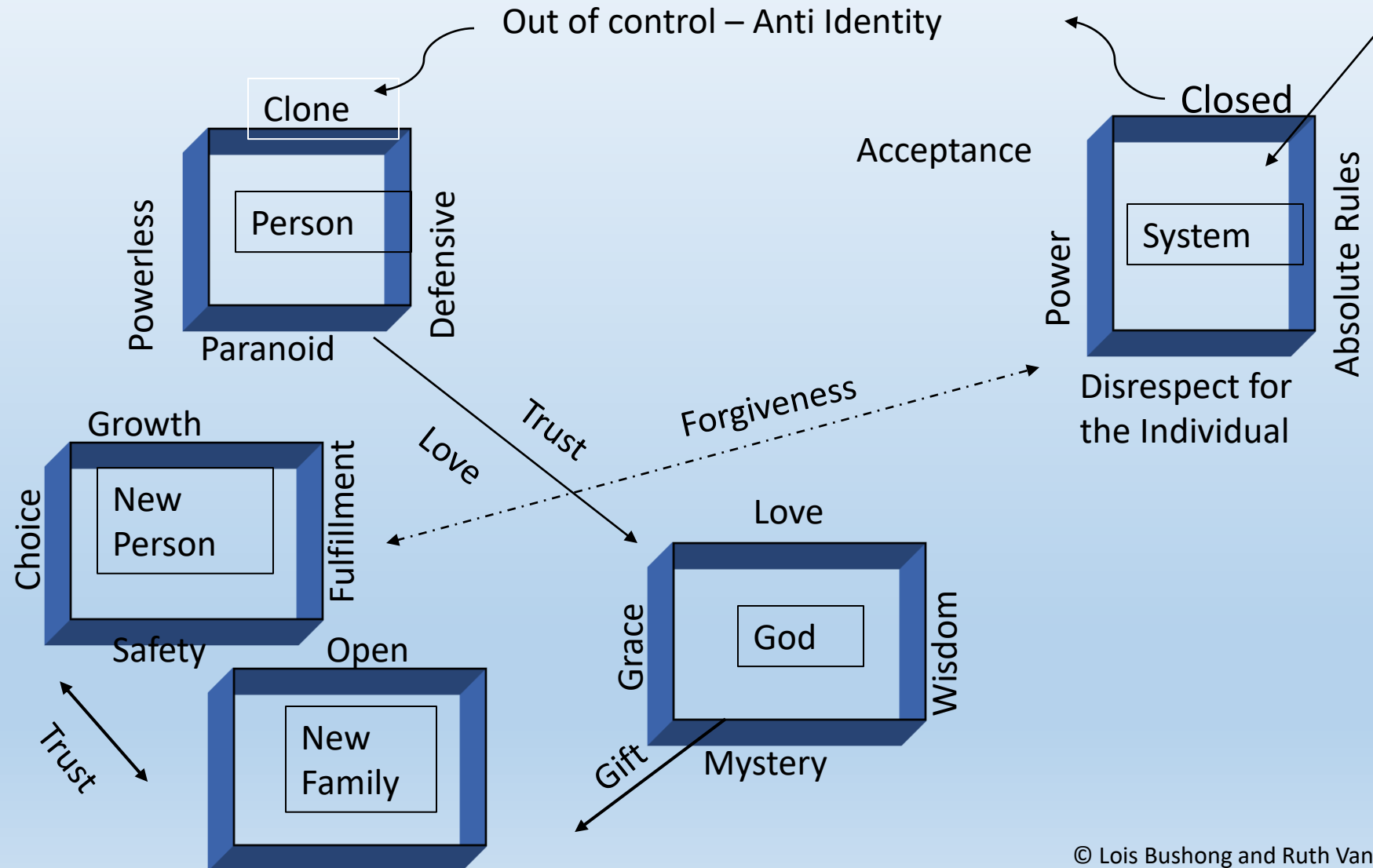

What is a system?

- A system consists of ‘interrelated and interactive elements’ subsystems.
- Each subsystem has its own subunits.
- Both the subsystems and their subunits are under the rules and routines that make up the organized whole.



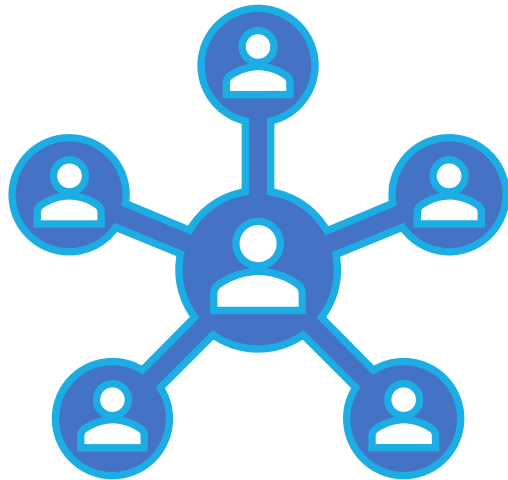
A system is more than the sum of its parts

- It's more than what each individual believes
- It's more than how each person would act if acting alone
- It consists of the unspoken as well as the spoken expectations and dynamics

Purpose of a system



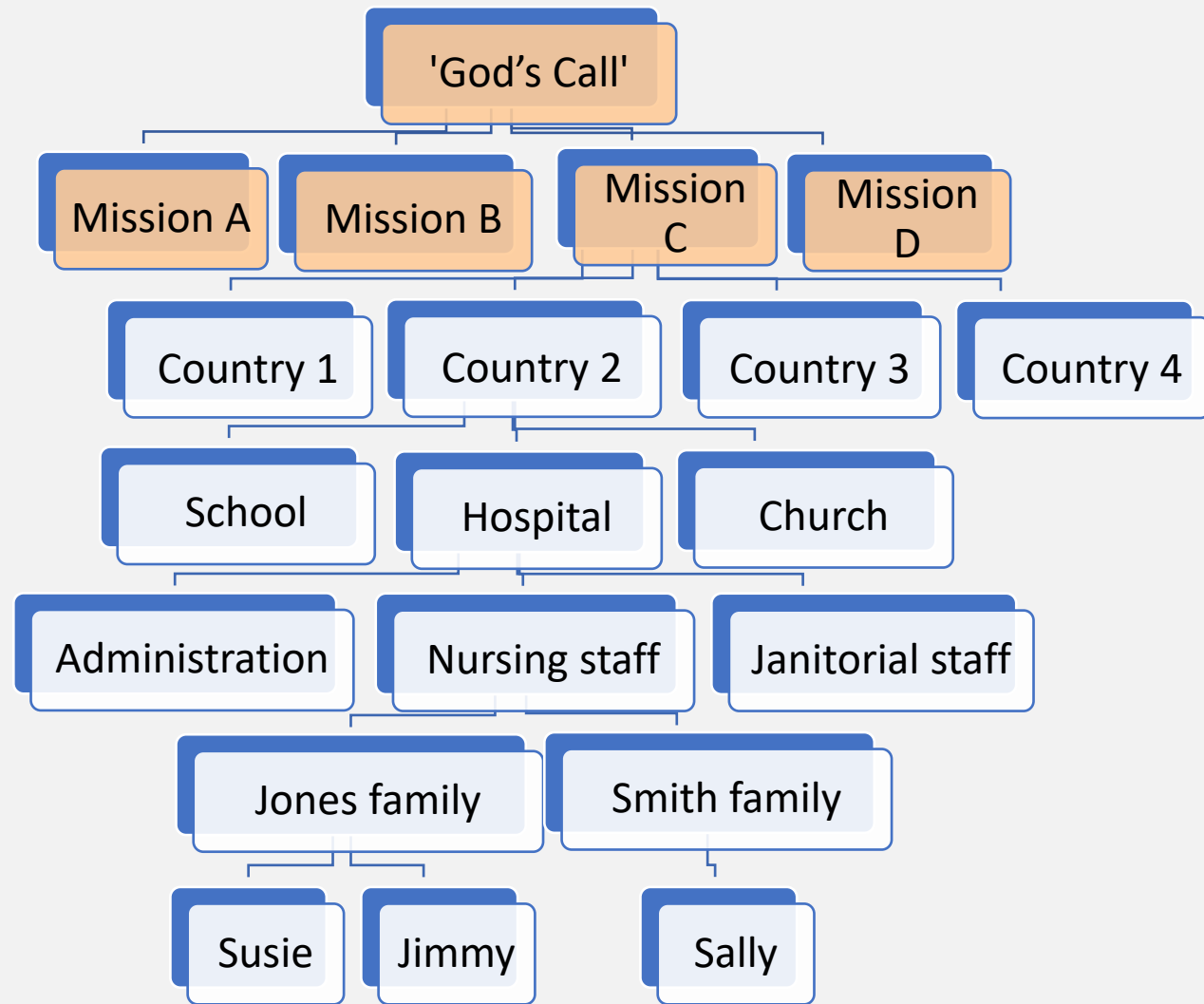
Creates stability / longevity

Promotes growth and change

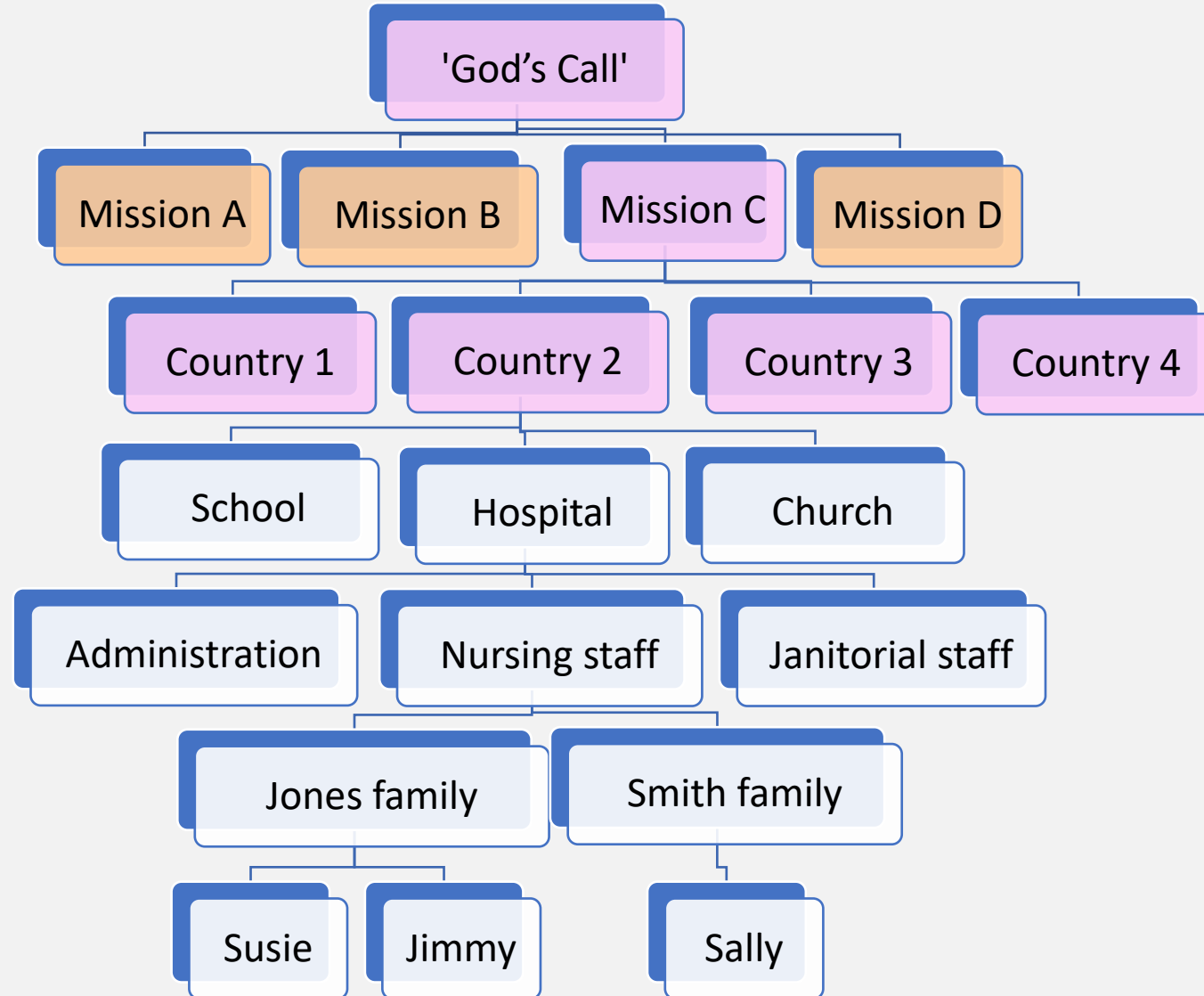
Gives a place of security and/or belonging

Creates predictability—both good and bad

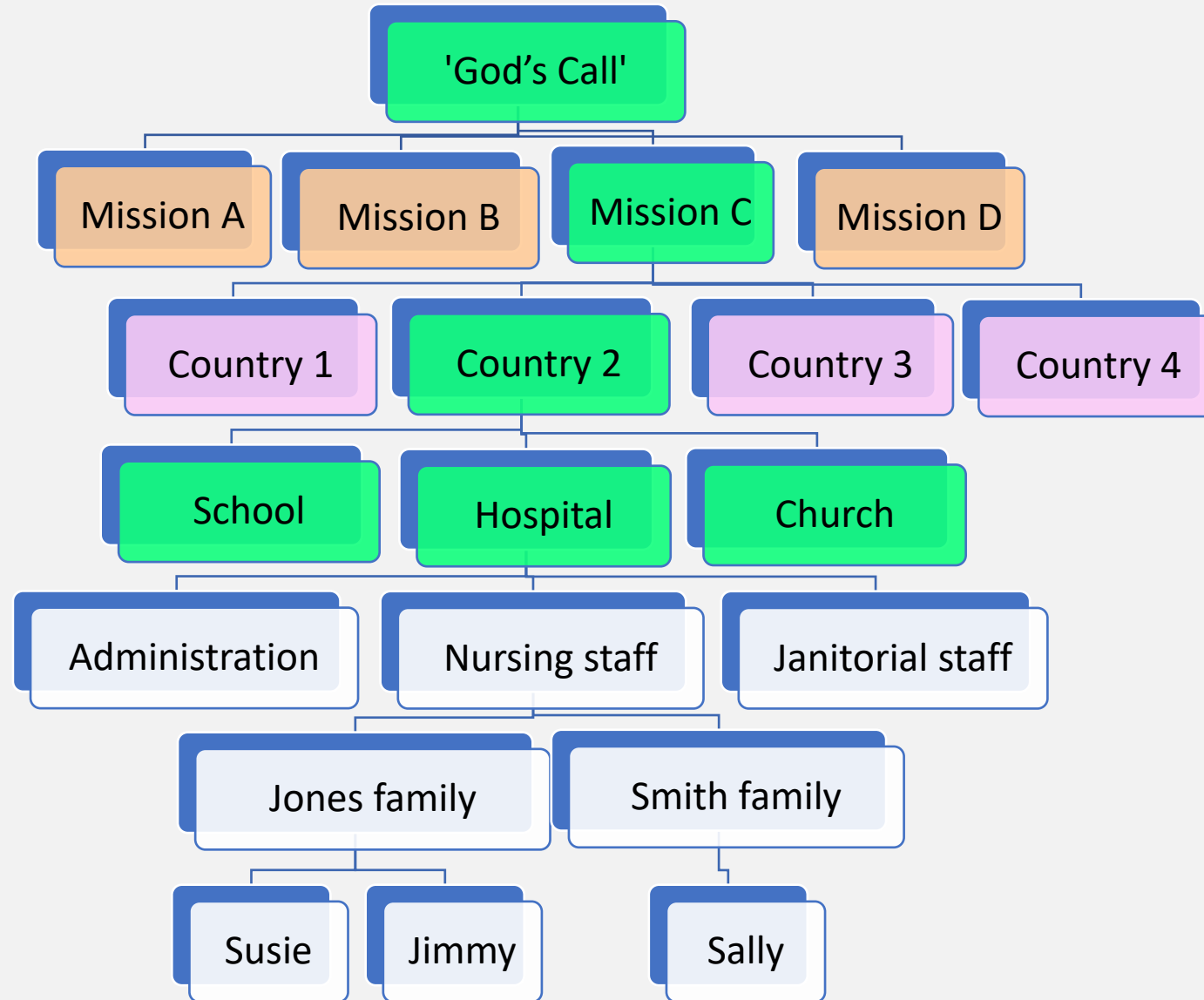
Example of a mission organizational system



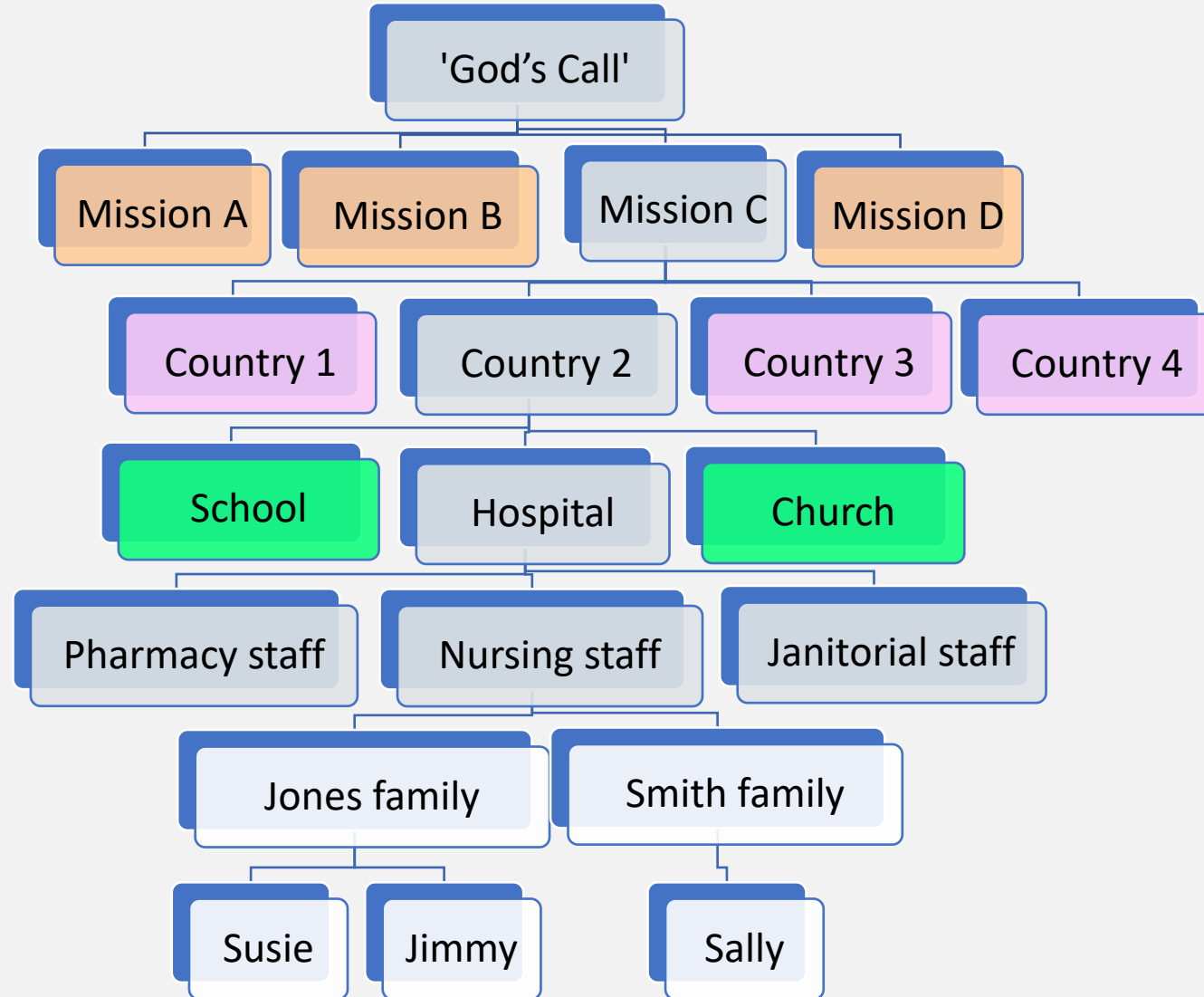

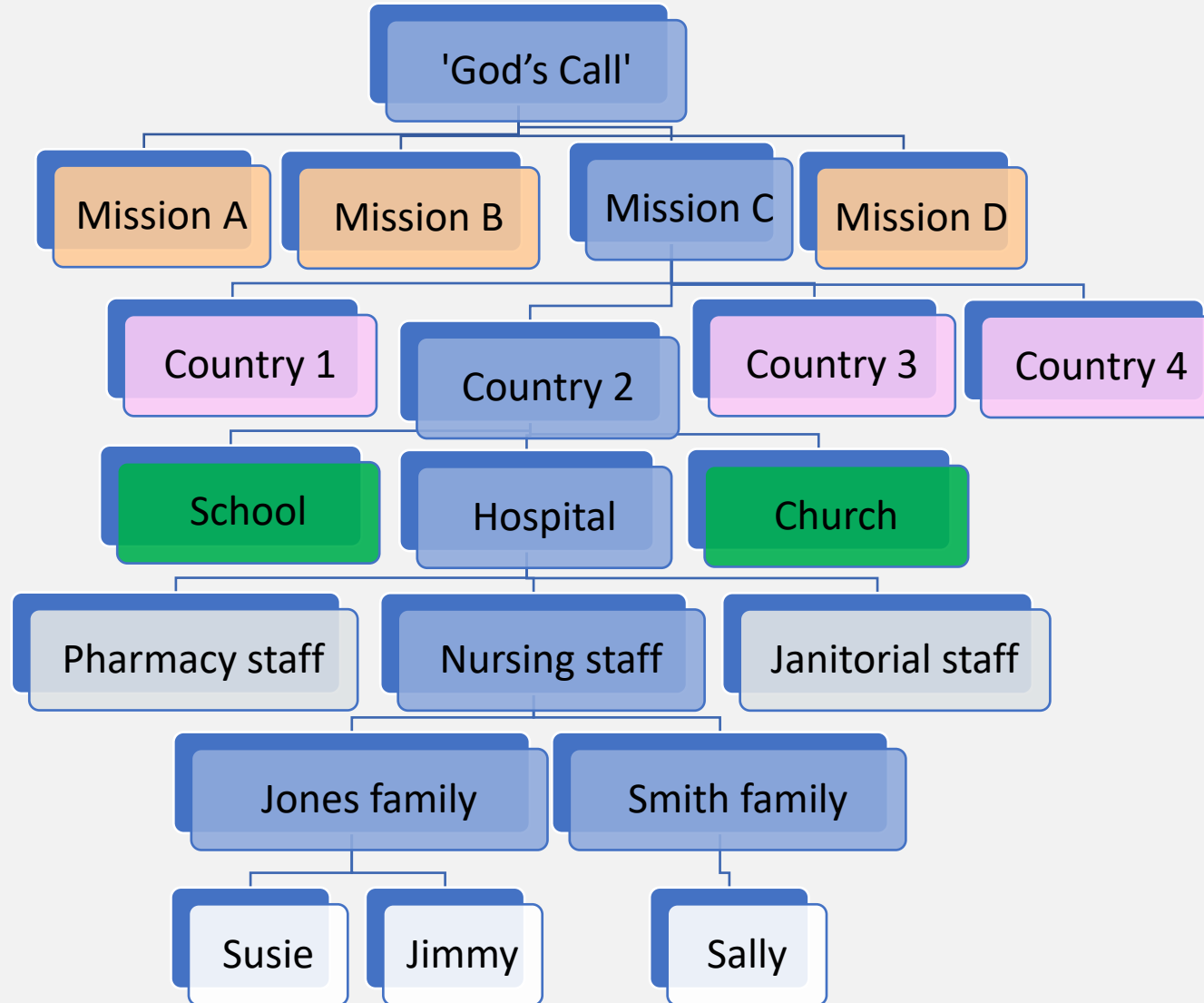

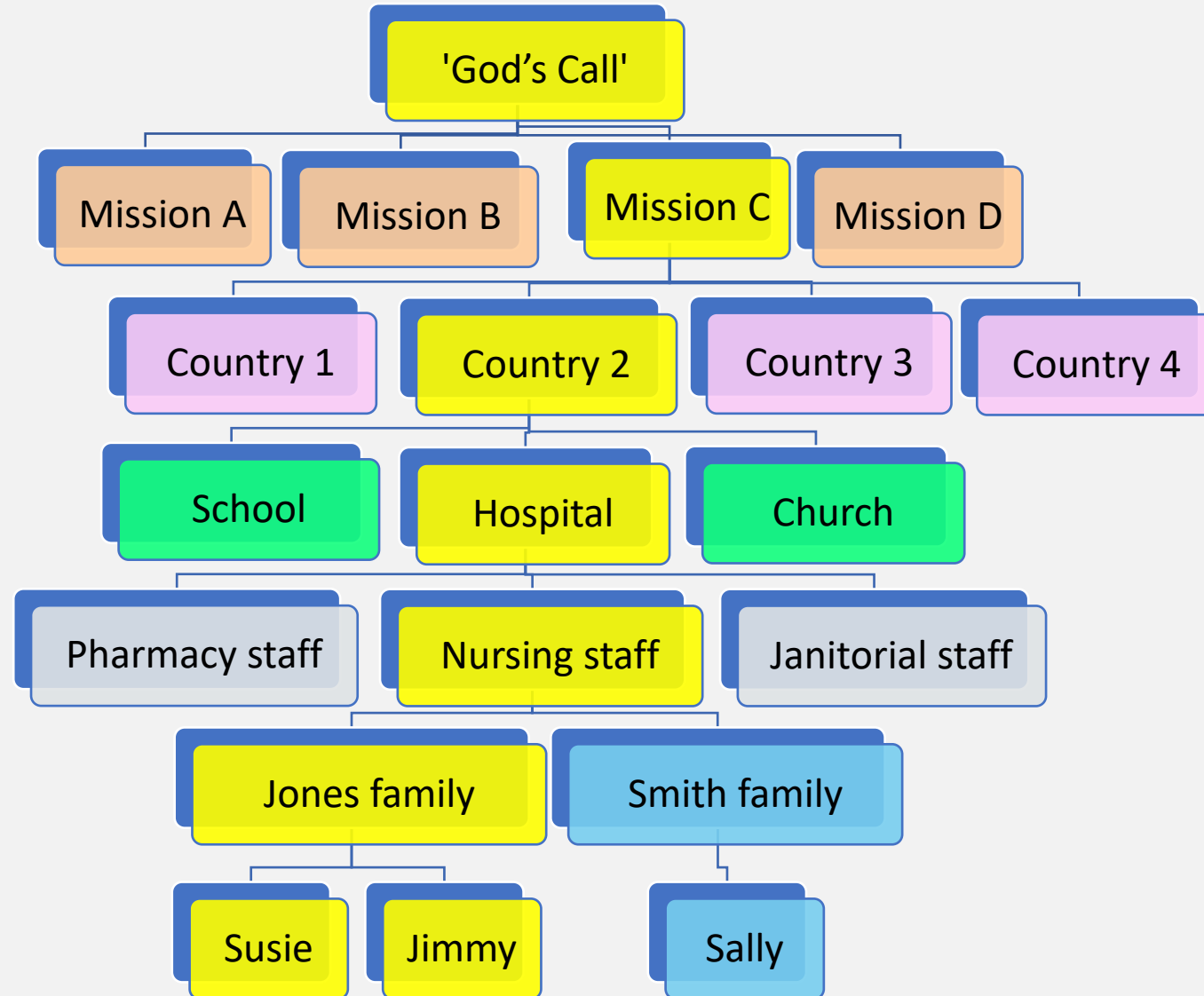

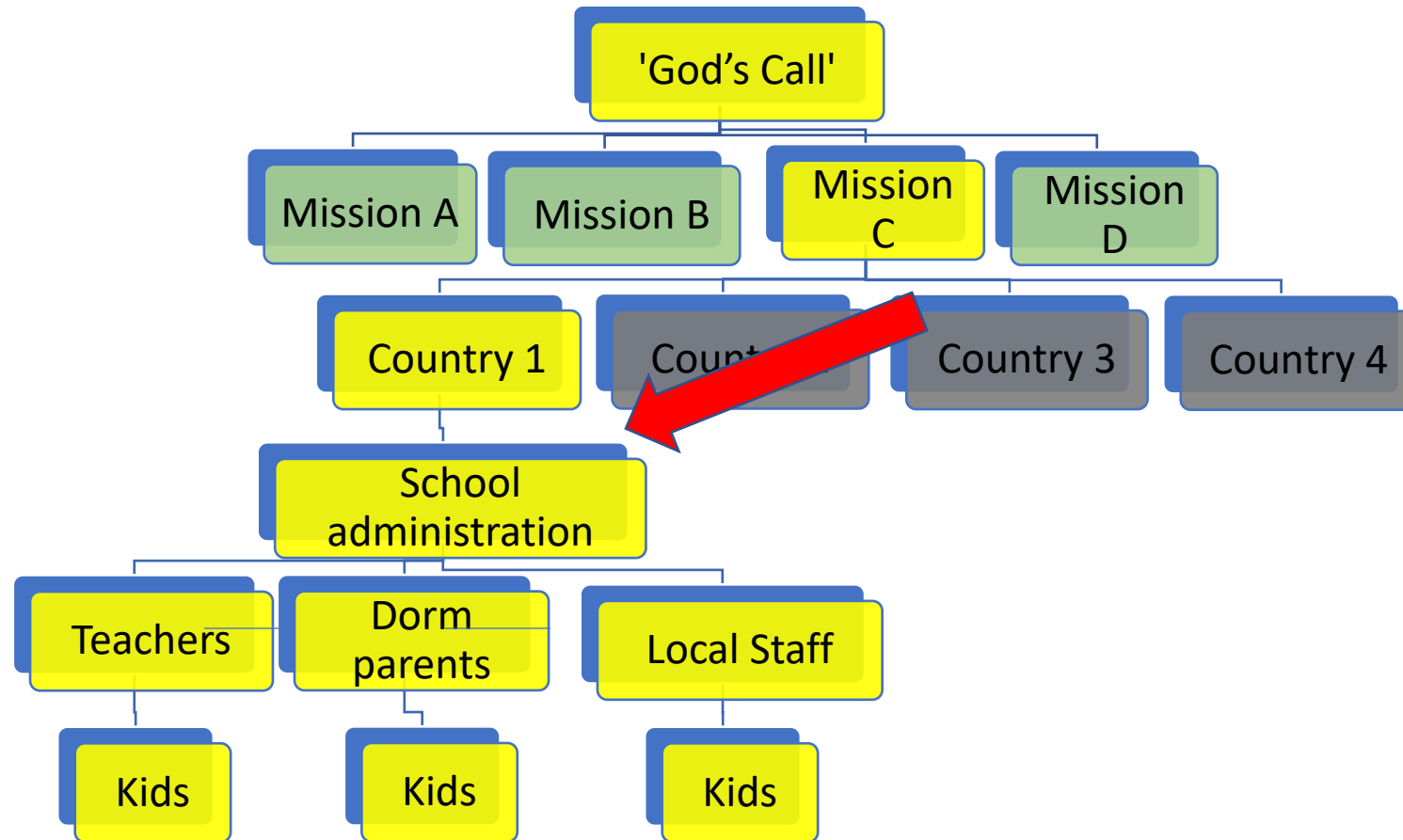

Lifecycle of a Healthy System

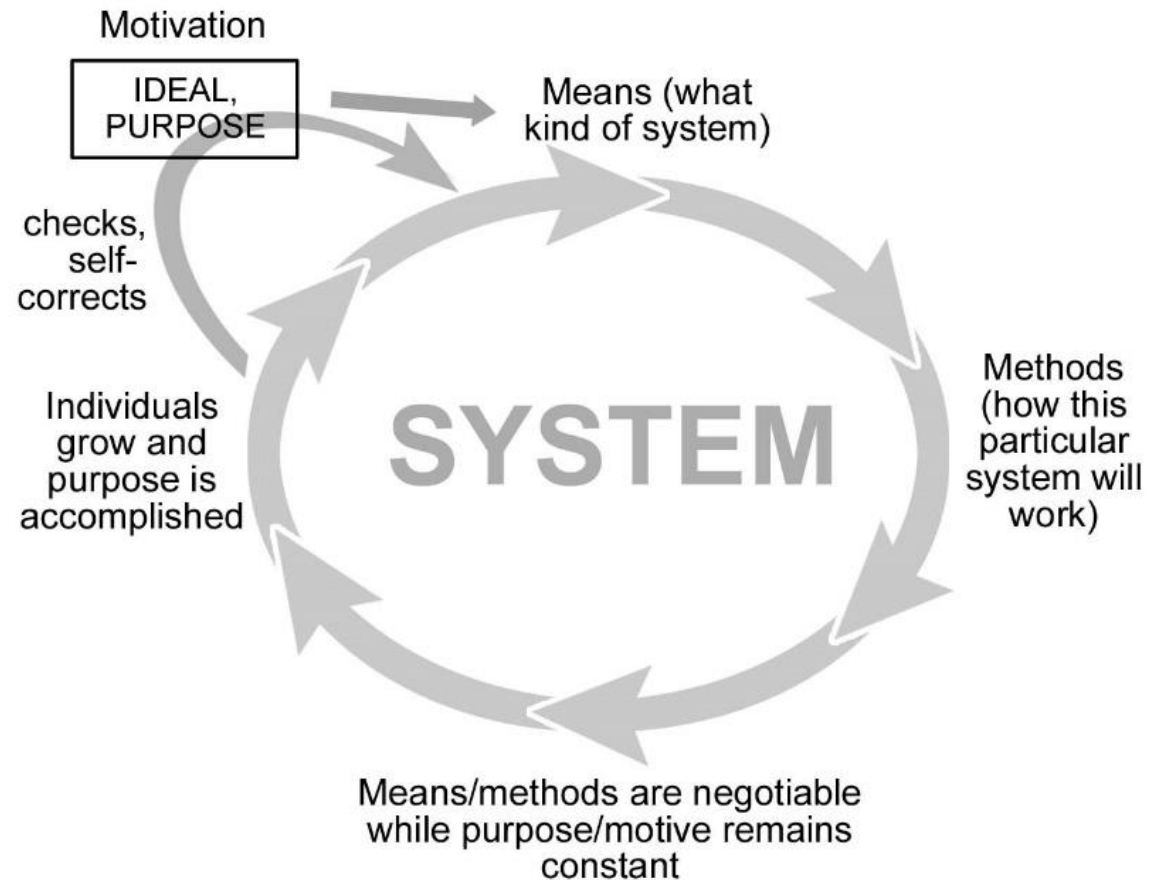
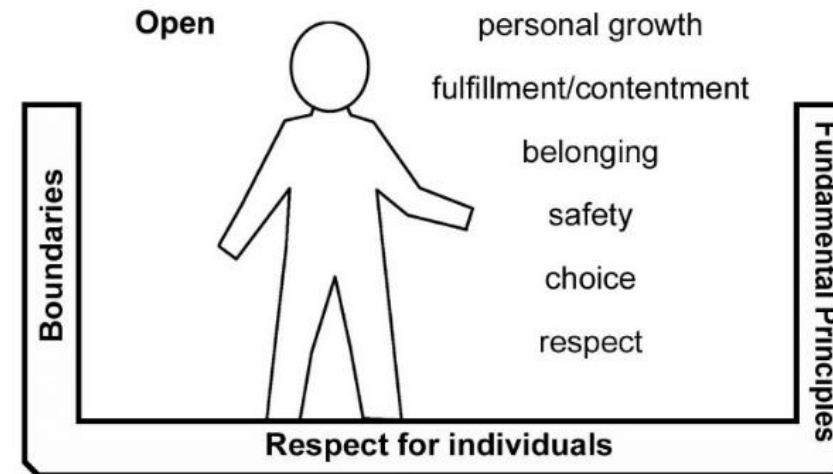

Lifecycle of an Unhealthy System

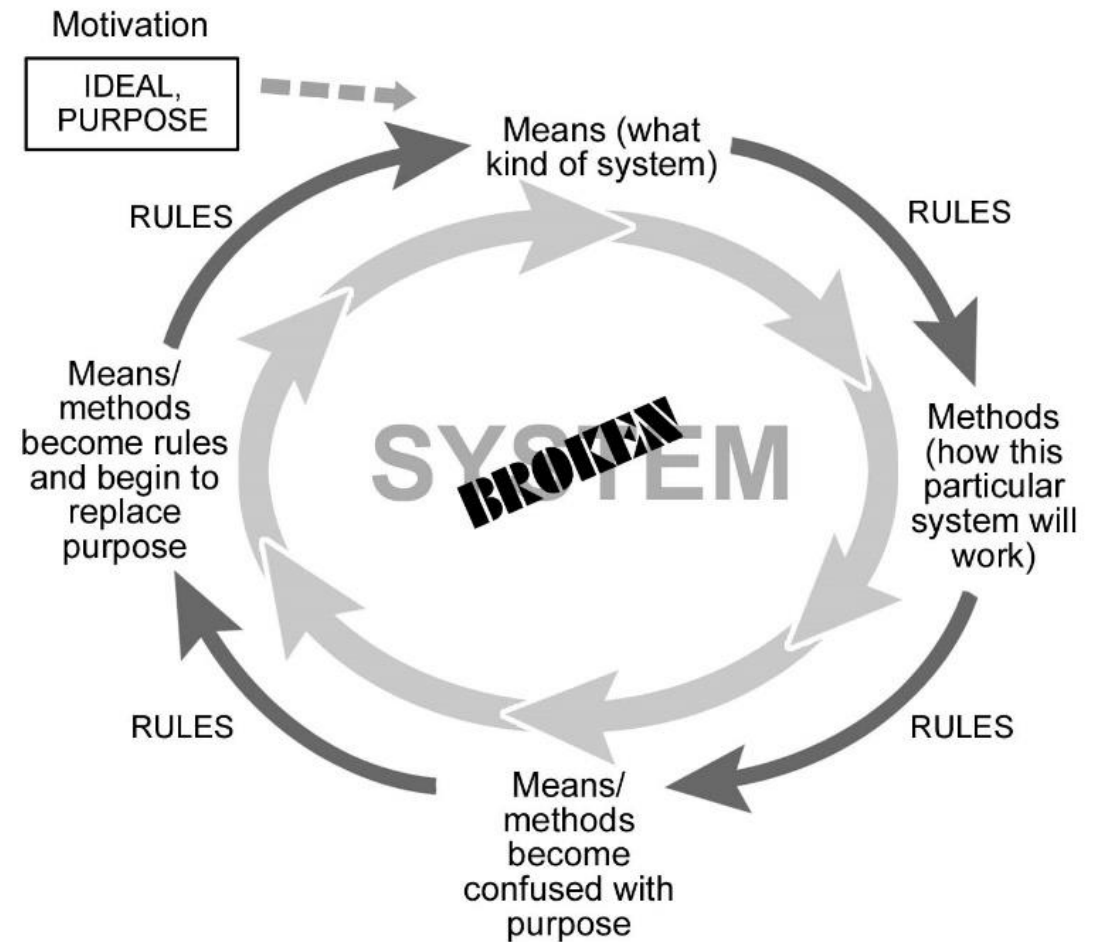
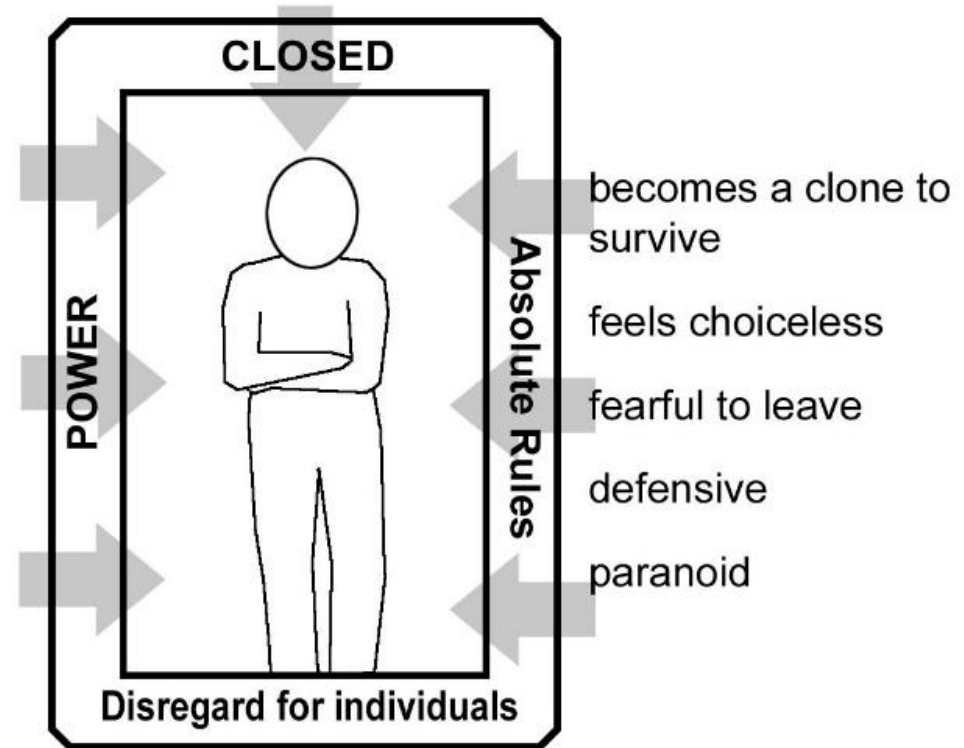

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Unhealthy system's effect

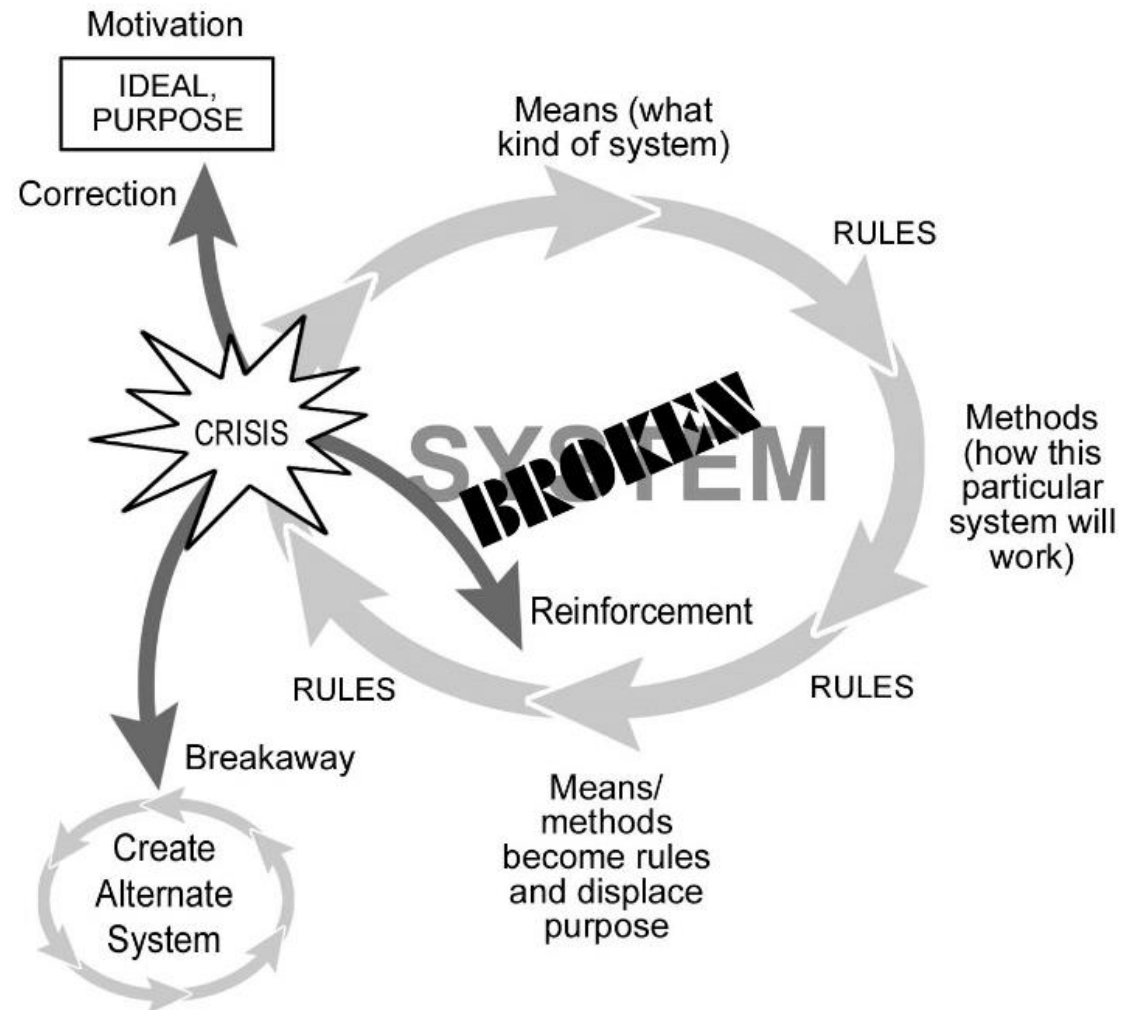

Lifecycle of a Sick System

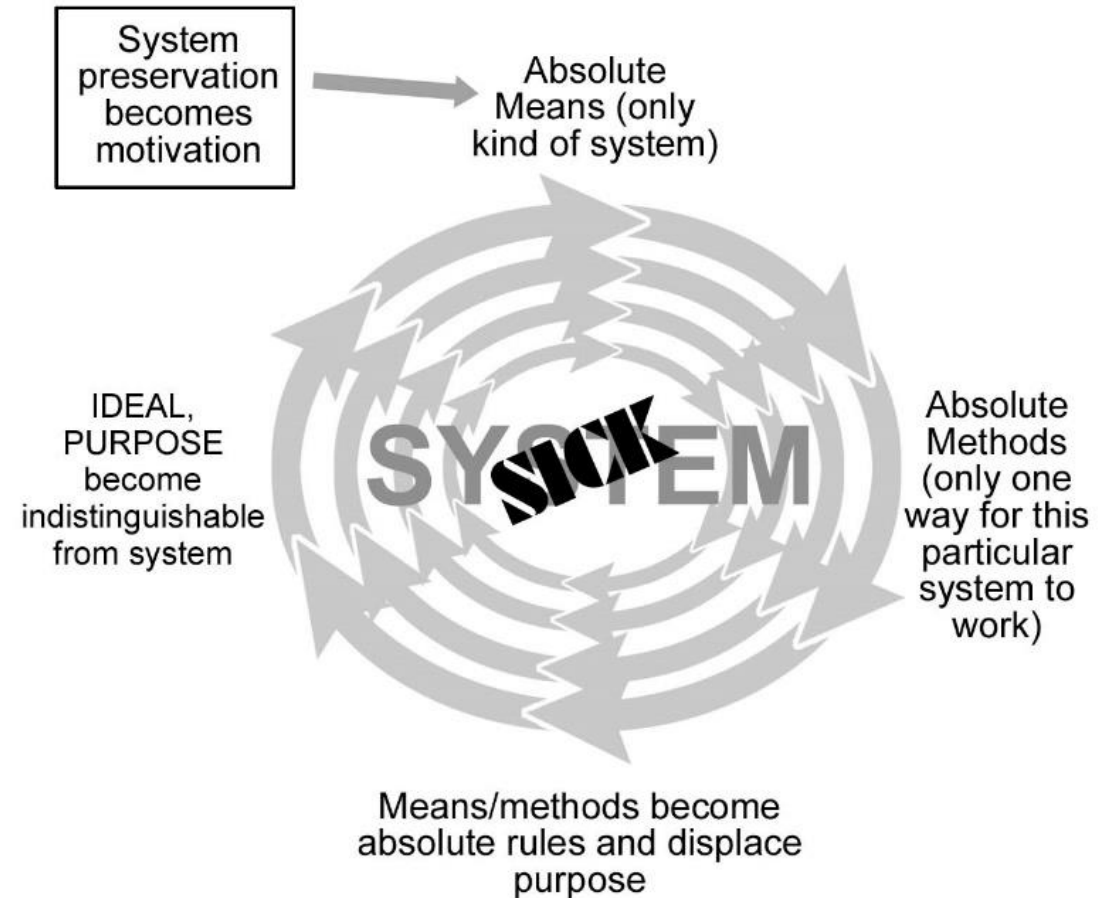

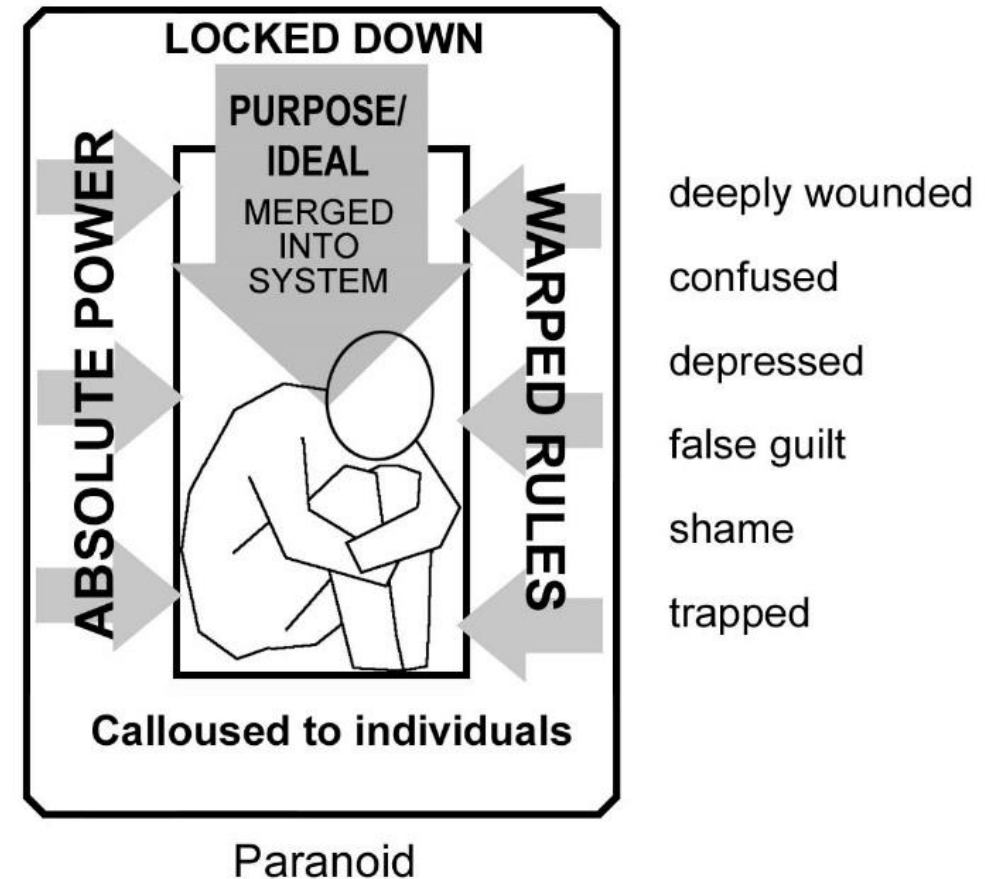

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Why do third culture communities/systems (e.g. military, foreign service, missions, international corporations) have particular power on/over TCKs?

- The decisions of the leaders of the organization/company can trump personal, parental decisions

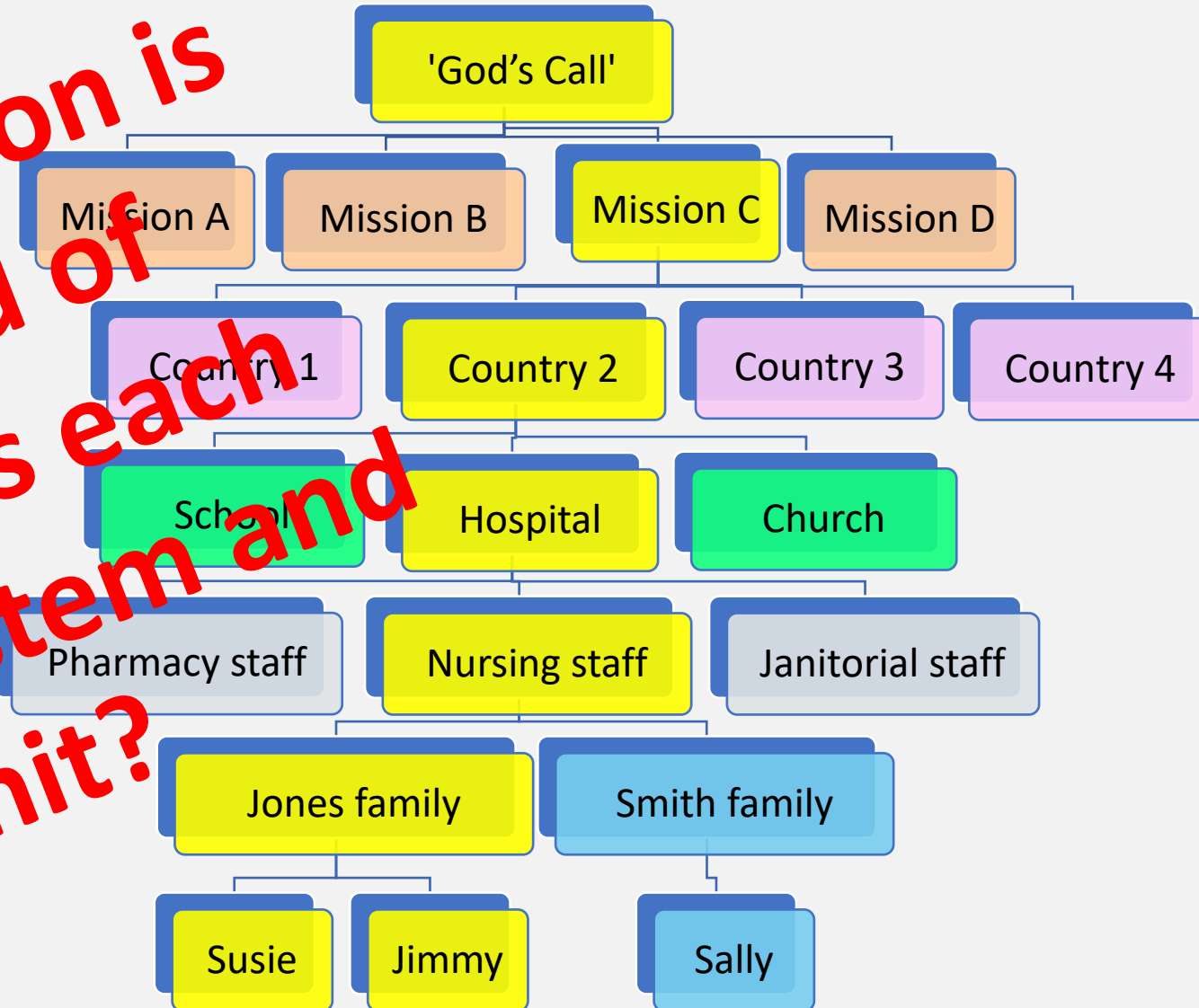
In addition, why do mission communities have deep impact on the MKs?

- The mission often serves as “family”
 - For many MKs, the “aunties” and “uncles” are more known to them than blood relatives
- ◎ Decisions are made according to “God’s will”
 - ◎ “Every MK knows there is something between parents and God...that is the system itself”

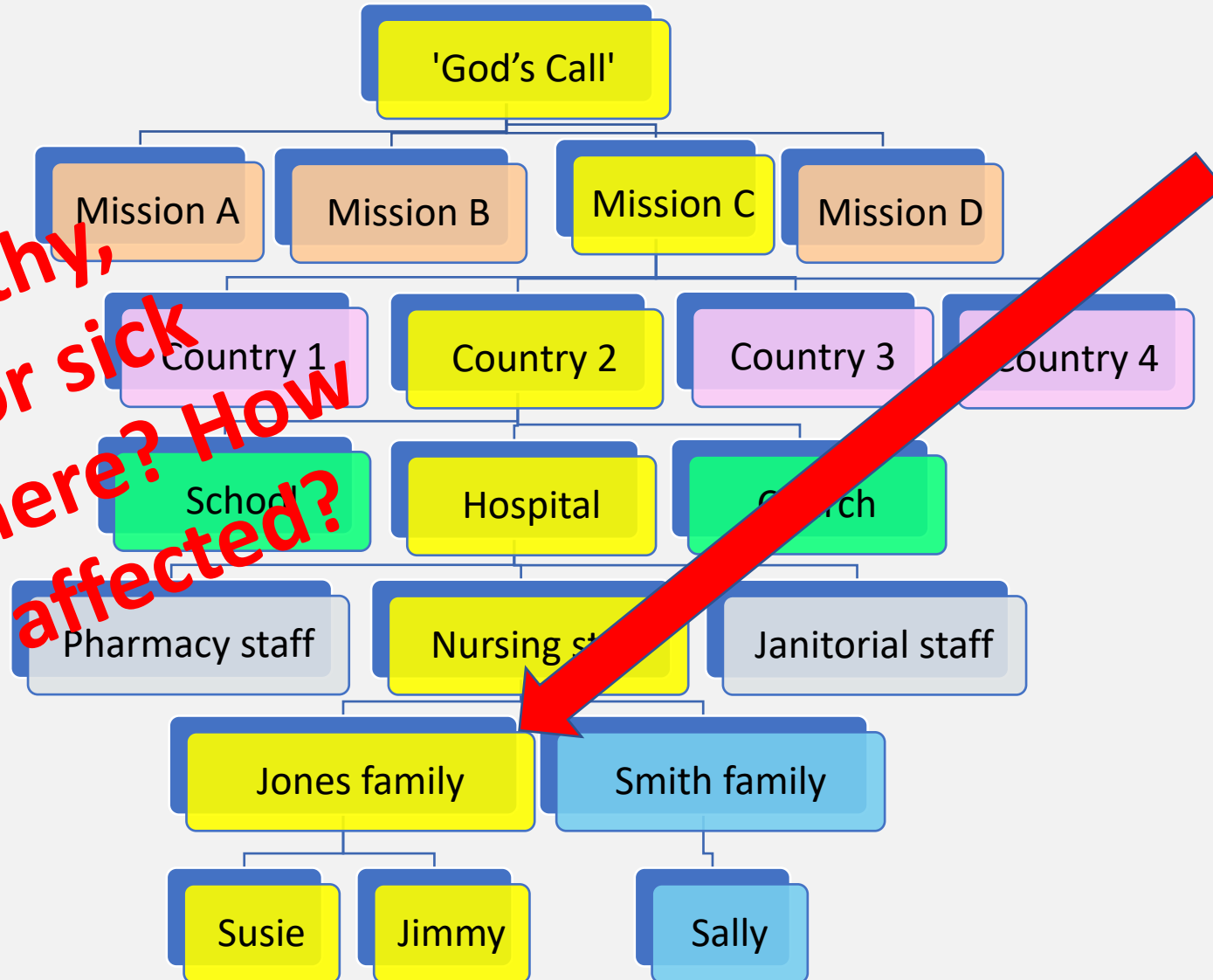


Example of a mission organizational system

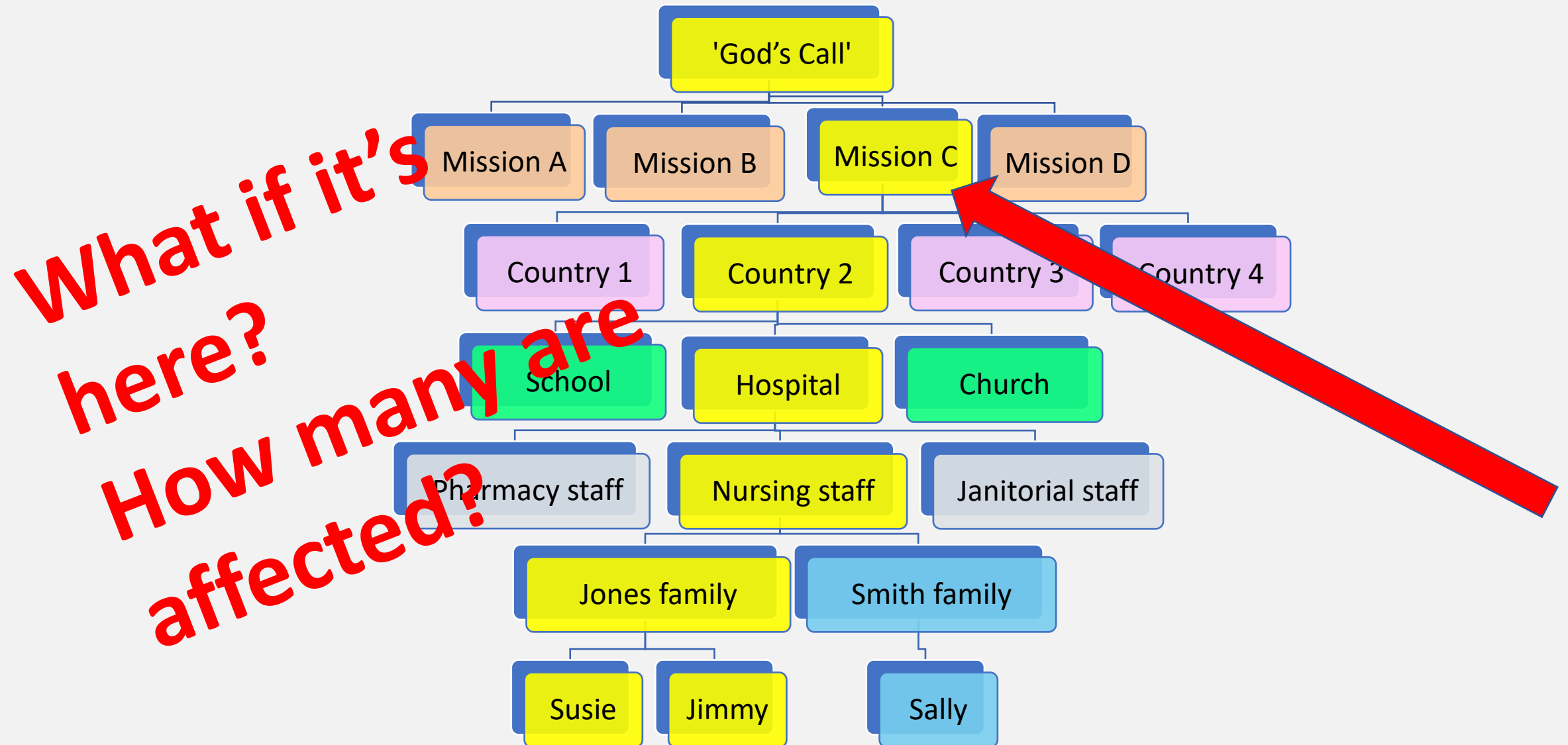

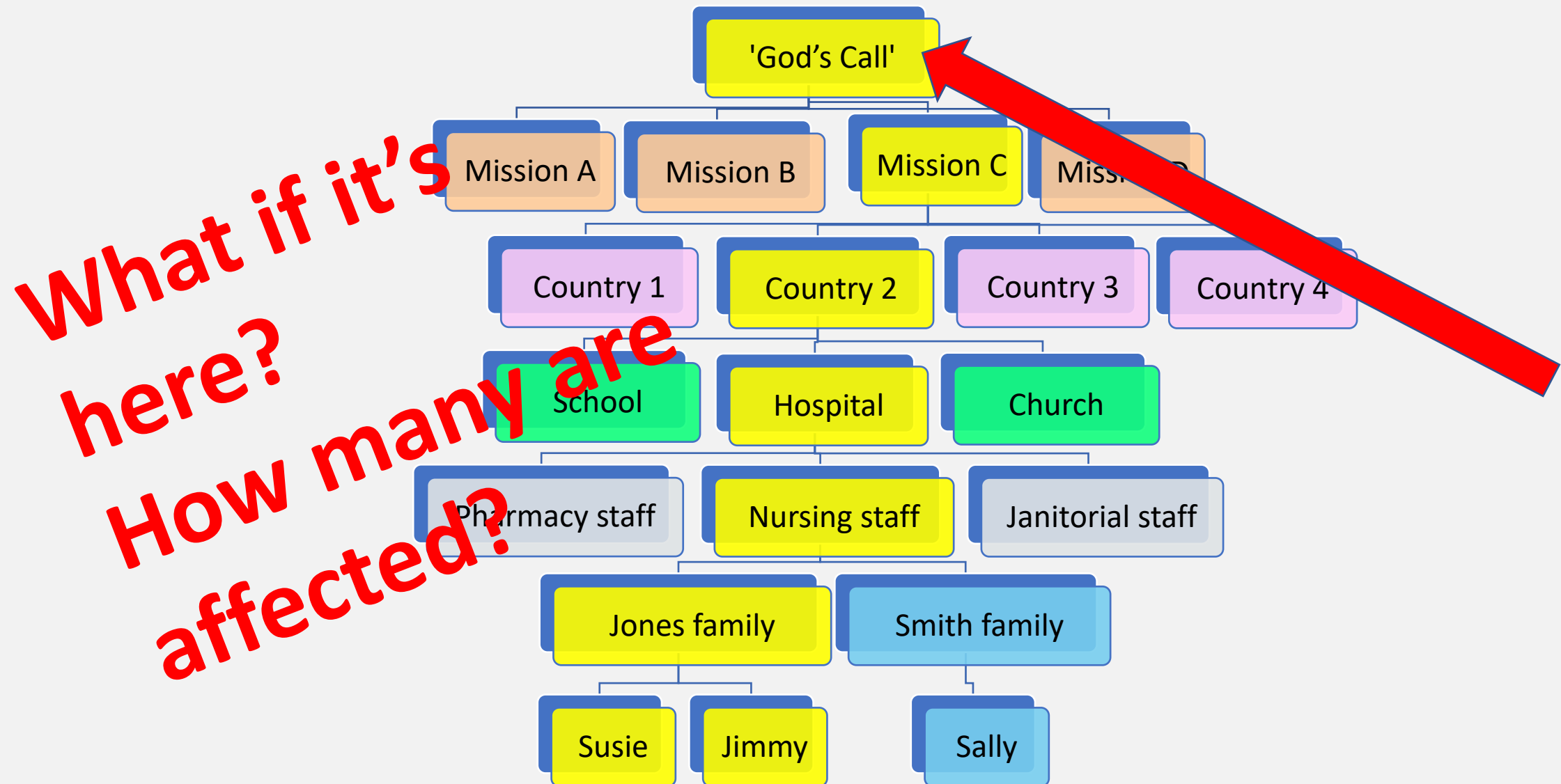

Privileges for me growing up as an MK in this context


- Opportunity to see what I considered miracles

- High, positive, expectations of others kept me 'on track'



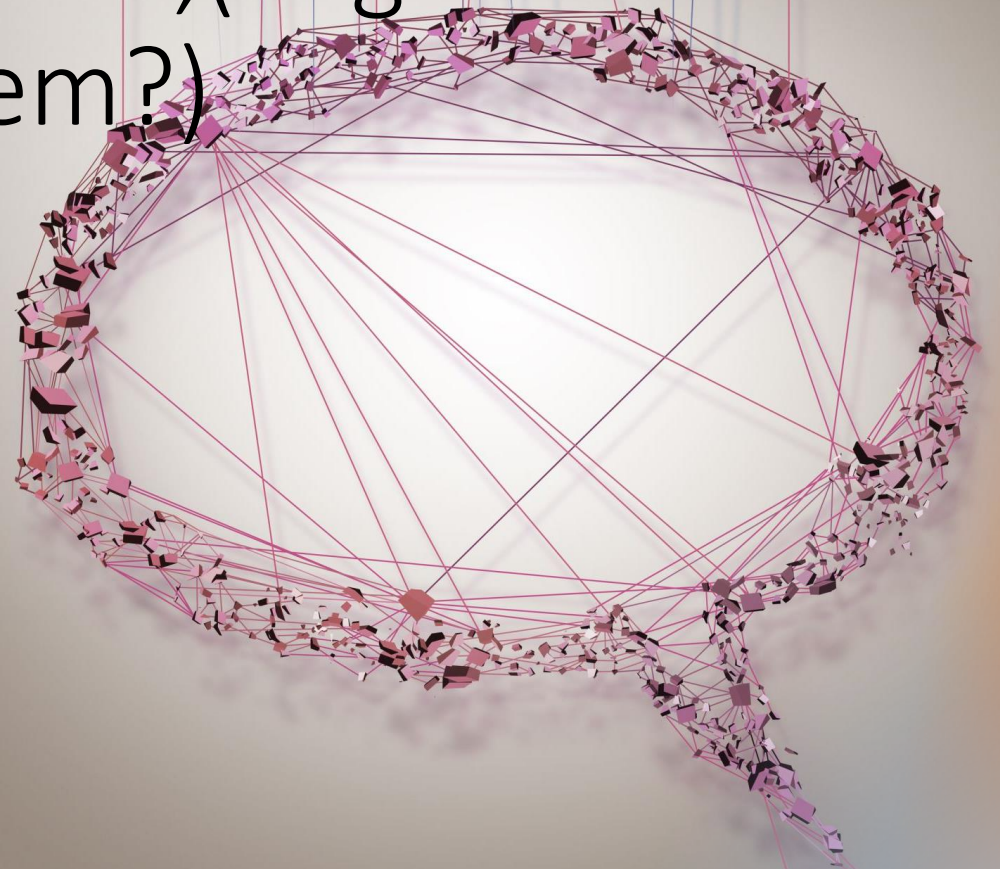

- When formulaic spiritual answers don't seem to work, where is God?
- How to turn head knowledge into true trusting relationship
 - Magical thinking
- Trying to live up to others' judgments or expectations of me can lead to shame and/or rebellion when I don't fit the system

What is potentially the Biggest Tangled Message of a religious system,(e.g. Pharisees or any God system?)

- God and the system are one.



More fallout of 'Tangled Message'...

- How we see the system is how we will see God
- If you go outside the rules or expectations of the mission system, you are disobeying God
- If you go outside the rules or expectations of the mission system, you have left 'true faith'

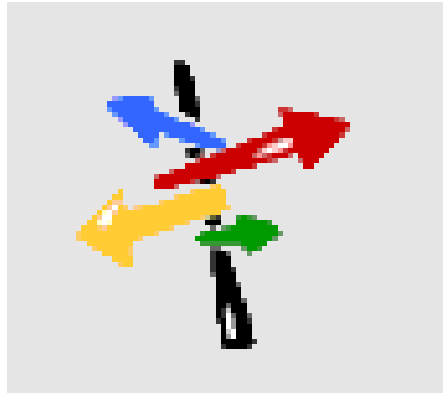




Further Fallout

What can develop?

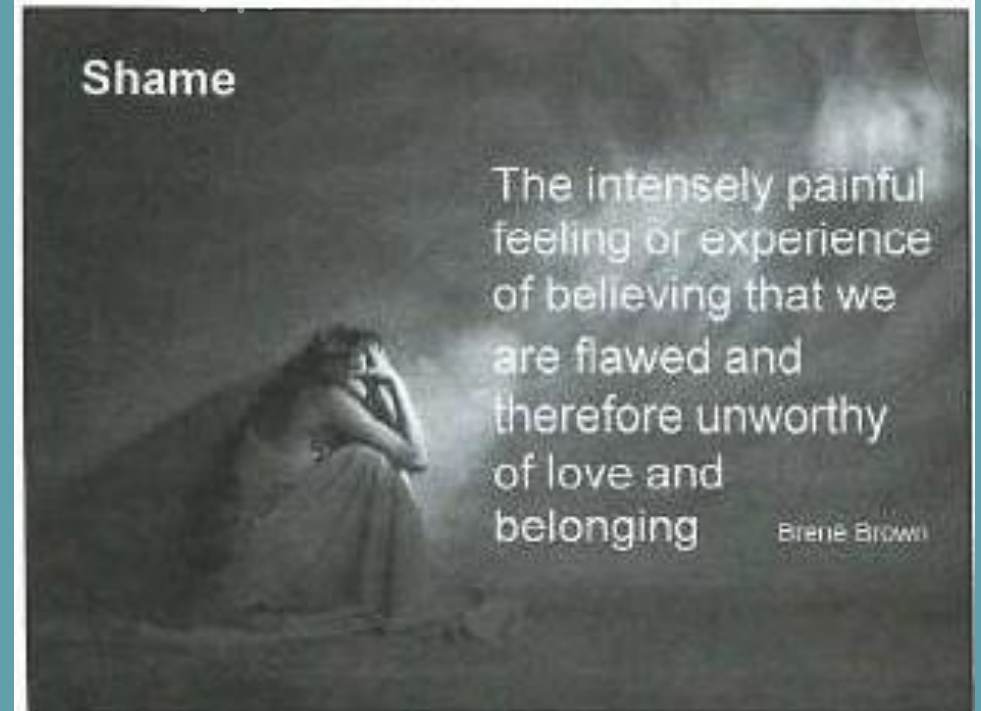


- View of God is distorted

When distorted messages are believed, they result in shame

- One Lutheran (!) AMK's words to me: "Guilt is for something you have done wrong, for sin. There is a healthy shame with that but the antidote for guilt is forgiveness. Shame is for who you are but the only antidote for that is grace. Too often we try to be forgiven for who we are but as human beings we forget that we were finite before we were sinful."



One response to shame...

- One important way to deal with shaming messages is when they come to ask “Who said?” and “Is this the truth?” And if not, what IS the truth that can replace it?
